
Crown Consorts

Career changes among senior political advisers have thrown up an interesting story which we can only say happened some time since **Bob Hawke** was first elected prime



Rainmakers find themselves high and dry

pin doctor Hill & Knowlton has had a major makeover of its Melbourne office, with most of the heavyweight rainmakers sprinting for the exit. Former general manager Rob Masters, the man who had the tough job of advising Esso through the Royal Commission into the Longford gas disaster, has called it a day after 10 years. Given that almost half the Hill & Knowlton Melbourne staff have quit this year, it is a touch ironic he is setting up a 'change management' outfit.
